Summary of the first Green Table meeting

The Éco-quartier NDG held its first meeting of the Green Table 2016 on February 3rd. There were nine of us who attended, a promising start for this brand new Green Table! We agreed to try and meet monthly to discuss future and ongoing projects and initiatives, exchange ideas, and move towards action for a better environment in NDG.

We discussed the Falaise St-Jacques, one of Montreal's ten eco-territories. The falaise is under threat because of the Turcot construction, and it also has a pervasive garbage problem. The group Sauvons la Falaise will be holding a big cleanup event, attended by multiple environmental groups and organizations and the event will possibly get some media cov-



erage. Interpretive walks will continue to be held regularly in the falaise to raise awareness about its ecological importance and


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2016 Speaking Rights Bursary - Equitas*

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A new service for senior caregivers

SARPAD Volunteer Centre, which offers volunteer services to Côtedes-Neiges and Outremont seniors, now offers, since last December, a new listening, information and support service for senior caregivers.

On February 29, at Rockhill apartments complex, was the inauguration of the awareness campaign for caregivers. On this occasion, Linda Couture, project

manager, did a presentation of

the project and its obiectives and Mr. Ivan Rochette talked, in a positive

and humoristic manner, about his experience as a caregiver.

The project's main objectives are to sensitize and inform caregivers on their role and the importance of getting help, to accompany and orient the caregivers towards the community or professional resources which are best adapted to their needs and to support the caregivers by accompanying them in their actions. The project

also aims to get the caregivers to know and identify their rights, needs and limits.

Caregivers who wish to benefit from SARPAD's services will have a personalized accompaniment. At the first interview, Ms. Couture presents and gives to the caregivers a support guide which was created specifically for them, and establishes with the person a list of his needs.

at the same time allowina him to vent on what he is aoina through. At the second interview, an action plan is created in order to oragnise the different



steps and therefore avoid exhaustion. Then, if needed, Ms. Couture refers the person to the appropriate resources. Following these two interviews, a follow-up is made by phone to see where the person is

at in her actions and to assure that she received the services she was referred to.

According to Ms. Couture, which has already received many requests, this project gives to the caregivers a certain form of recognition and allows her to pin point the needs that are still to be

A real portrait of homelessness in Montreal and in Côte-des-Neiges

In March 2015, there was a count of the homeless people in all of Montreal. This count, as many organizations implicated in the homelessness topic realised, does not reflect reality. As an example, 6 homeless people were counted in Côte-des-Neiges, while the foot patrol officers of the local police station 26 counted over 40. As a feedback to the count, the RAP-SIM (Réseau d'Aide aux Personnes Seules et Itinérantes de Montréal) created, in collaboration with different actors in Montreal, a publication: Homelessness in Montreal, above the numbers. At the launching of the publication on March 10th, over 100 people were present to listen to people from different organizations talk about the reality of homelessness in different neighbourhoods and

for different populations. Bernard Besancenot, animator and liaison officer with the community at Multicaf, made a presentation on the reality of homelessness in Côtedes-Neiges. RAPSIM's publication is available through their website at rapsim.org.



Concerning Côtedes-Neiges, many workers from different resources mobilized around the topic to create a true portrait of homelessness in Côte-des-Neiges.

One of the main characteristics that came out of it is the fact that a great part of homelessness in Côte-des-Neiges could be qualified as "hidden homelessness". Indeed, a great number of people,

without sleeping in the streets, do not have a fix address (sleep at a friend's house, go back to an exboyfriend) or live in filthy apart-

A publication is being produced to present and detail homelessness realities in Côte-des-Neiges. This publication will be available on May 18, and on that same date there will be a forum on homelessness in Côte-des-Neiges. Many key actors of the community will be invited to come get more information on Côte-des-Neiges's homelessness reality, and also to take part in different workshops aiming to develop strategies and solutions to fight homelessness and to take more adequate actions in order to fulfil the different needs.

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Jennifer Interviews

This month Jennifer Chapman turns her attention to the Hip Hop You Don't Stop coordinator, Marc Pagliarulo-Beauchemin.

Jennifer: Marc! How long have you worked fro Prevention CDN-**NDG**³

Marc: 11 years!! I've worked with the team since March 2005.

Jennifer: How did you end up working here?

Marc: One day, I met Fred (who was in charge of the Graffiti program back then) at Villa Maria metro. Asking wassup, he told me Prevention CDN-NDG got a grant from CNPC (Centre National de Prévention du Crime) for putting together a Hip Hop festival as a

crime prevention program. Being an involved artist of the Montreal Hip Hop scene as part of Atach Tatua, a well known band at that time, I was pretty interested by the project! He asked me to send him my CV and he told me that I got the job a couple days after.

Jennifer: In what way does the Urban Arts program play an important role in the community?

Marc: This amazing program gives the opportunity to the youth (whatever their background) to express themselves through art instead of wasting their time doing non-con-

structive things. We are working with all the community organizations that offer activities related to urban arts through the year. Also, we are inviting established and professional local artists and even internationally known artists to participate and share their experience to the youth to show them what is possible to do when you put effort and energy into something constructive.

Jennifer: What is one of the most challenging things about your job?

Marc: Putting together a high quality cultural event with small means: small team, small budget, etc.

Jennifer: What is one of the most rewarding things about your job? Marc: When I see the smiles on the faces of the participating youth that are dancing or singing or playing music or painting, I got the feeling that the program is working well.

Jennifer: If you were going to start your own non-profit organization, what would the mandate be? Marc: Hmmm ... Good question. I think it would be related to art and more specifically to the democratisation of art. Helping youth have access/through art to the different tools they need and teach them how to use those to express themselves throw art.

Marc and special guest, the legendary B-Boy Ken Swift (VII Gems / Rock Steady Crew, NYC) at the 10th edition of Hip Hop All they know is that I'm You Don't Stop (10 years after the 1st time / last time he came to Montreal, performing at HHYDS 2005!!!).

Jennifer: If you were the Mayor of Montreal, what is the first change you would put into effect? Marc: More place for bicycles, community transports and ecofriendly projects (LEED constructions, urban gardens, urban honey, composting ...). In a more idealistic way, have a global vision for our city, speaking about its architectural development: architecture, urban development ... Developing / constructing a city are incredible opportunities to create a beautiful space to live

Jennifer: Do you have other artists on your music label, or only yourself and your projects?

Marc: I don' have a music label

anymore. We stopped our activities in 2009. It was more a tool for us making it possible to produce / promote our own music (as a band).

Jennifer: If you were to sign the entire staff of Prev as one band/project to your label, what style would the music be, what would you call it, and which Festival would you submit it to? Marc: It would be a really eclectic band. It would be a rock/reggae/rap/dancehall/punk/electro nic/acoustic/jazz band. Wassup with that?! We would perform at SXSW for sure. Ha!

Jennifer: What are the three most played tracks on your playlist?

> Marc: L\$D (A\$AP Rocky -AT.LONG.LAST.A\$AP), The bird (Anderson Paak - Malibu) and Feeling Light (me, Waahli (Nomadic Massive) and my DJ, Toast Dawg -Brazivilain vol.2 revisité)

Jennifer: What do your kids think you do?

Marc: They think it's to go to a park and listen to music, dance, see murals on trucks and eat amazing takizas (tacos)!!!

Seriously, I think they don't know at all what a job is. working a lot in front of my computer.

Jennifer: Marc, I need you to tell me the truth about this next question, as hard as it may be to answer. Have you ever been on a boat?
