Hello everyone,

The pandemic, the pandemic, the pandemic, time and time again, the pandemic, we know that. Like this global disaster that has led to a reassessment of how the whole world works, Prevention CDN-NDG is no exception. For us, 2021 was a year of adapting to the needs of communities, of evaluating certain projects, of improving management tools and services to the population, while being a year of resilience, patience and dedication.

The establishment of new youth programs with the Prevention of delinquency through sport, art and culture and the Prevention of psychoactive substance use has made it possible to reinforce the complementarity of youth services within the organization. The enhancement of services to homeless folks via the day drop-in and the mobile intervention team in CDN have definitely improved the service offered to this segment of the highly vulnerable population.

Health constraints, staff turnover, professional exhaustion, instability of funding have all been palpable challenges, but we are leaving this year 2021 with a sense of accomplishment, with the certainty that a strong management and intervention base is strengthened on a daily basis to ensure future sustainability. The loyal support of the board, the dedication of the intervention team, the commitment and creativity of the coordinators Ingrid and Chloé are the pillars that have enabled us to meet our challenges.

The social impact that CDN-NDG Prevention had in 2021 is immeasurable, but the work done by the team is palpable and I am eternally grateful. We obviously thank our many funders, who give us the opportunity to carry out relevant and ambitious projects.

For 2022, we hope for a little stability, while having the chance to pursue our ambitions to have the maximum positive social impact.

The Tandem team, whose work covers the entire borough of Côte-des-Neiges – Notre-Dame-de-Grâce, is mandated with offering citizens both individual and collective strategies to reduce the risk of becoming victims of crime as well as to increase their feelings of security both personally and as a community.

TANDEM primarily focuses on the three following themes:

People's personal security:

through information sessions to women, safety audits, workshops on safety in public spaces, stranger awareness for youth aged 6-12.

Safety of people's personal property:

Safety of people's personal property through home security evaluations, engraving of personal property, or fraud prevention workshops.

Security for communities at large:

Work in the so-called vulnerable sectors, working with citizens' groups, and illegal tagging issues. More popular subjects include internet safety, cyberbullying, safety in public spaces, public transportation safety, fraud prevention, as well as others.

Éco-Quartier in 2021

- Around 560 People were informed about waste management, subsidies for diapers and feminine hygiene products, volunteering, etc.
- Eco-quartier provided information to the citizens of NDG by telephone, by email, and in person.
- Dissemination of several information activities via social networks such as Facebook and Instagram on the new food waste collection, as well as the various programs offered by Éco-quartier
- 300 buildings with more than 10,119 doors benefited from awareness-raising through door-to-door visits in Loyola territory on the new compost collection.
- 287 businesses, institutions, and industries benefited from awareness-raising through door-to-door visits in Loyola territory on the new compost collection.
- 28 Workshops offered in-person in schools and daycare centers on composting and recycling.
- 8 information and awareness kiosks on activities offered by Éco-quartier in NDG parks.
- Processing of more than 54 grant applications for the washable diapers and feminine hygiene program.
- Processing of 66 installation sheets for the replacement of recycling bins and the addition of additional equipment for apartment buildings.
- Around 559 compost bins were replaced and around 80 compost bins were repaired by Éco-quartier.
- Monitoring and management of the 2 community composting sites in NDG.

Éco-quartier NDG works in the domain of urban cleanliness by encouraging citizens not to litter, respect garbage and recycling pickup schedules, properly use street garbage bins and reduce pollution from canine waste. We also promote food waste collection, nature in the City and beautification. Finally, we work with community organizations, schools and citizens to plan local clean-ups.



BEAUTIFICATION

- Annual distribution of flowers to more than 400 families and community groups.
- Follow-up with ash tree owners on available treatment options.

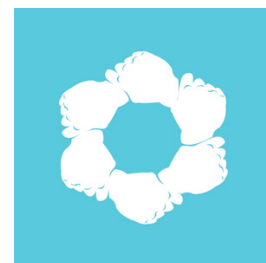

2 new youth programs were launched in 2021. The 1st being the Prevention of psychoactive substance use among young people, allowing workshops to be offered in schools and organizations, while participating in an inspiring community of practice. The second being the Prevention of delinquency through art, sport and culture allowing the animation of sporting and artistic activities for young people, also in secondary schools.

These programs clearly reinforce the complementarity of youth services at Prévention CDN-NDG.

Grief project

Grieving is a topic that has caught everyone's attention since the start of the pandemic.

Thanks to funding from the CIUSS foundation, the two Youth Tables (CDN and NDG) were approached to see if it would be possible to promote a project that would focus on grief and organize activities that would give young people a space for a discussion of the various losses they have suffered.

Participating organizations included:
CDN-NDG Prevention, Loyola Youth, Baobab Familial and the CDN Youth Center.

Equipped with paper and markers, young people from elementary school, accompanied by day camp workers and CDN/NDG Prevention staff were invited to draw pictures and talk about their feelings about the things they lost during the pandemic.

The teens followed interactive workshops on emotional resilience, led by Koffi, a speaker from the MDJ CDN. The intervention and coordination team was accompanied by Lisa Ndejuru, PHD and psychotherapist specializing in resilience and post-traumatic stress disorder.



Mobile intervention team



Since the start of the pandemic, the situation of people experiencing homelessness or residential instability has seriously deteriorated, accentuating the use of public spaces and making urban cohabitation more complex. Thanks to the support of the CDN-NDG Borough, we have been able to set up a mobile intervention team that goes out to meet users, in order to provide them with support, listening, referrals and follow-ups. .

The mobile intervention team used to make the direct link between the Halte-Chaleur and users in parks, metro and other public spaces,

Outreach work for seniors in CDN

2021 has not been an easy year for seniors outreach work in CDN, with many challenges in terms of human resources to ensure continued service. We were still able to offer services to seniors in CDN and we hope that the project can be stabilized in 2022. In the meantime, we have been able to refer people in need to other of our stakeholders or partner organizations.

Halte-chaleur in 2021

While the pandemic persisted, thanks to renewed funding, and despite challenges of reduced capacity, the need to increase hygiene measures and the implementation of COVID-19 protocols, Prévention CDN NDG relaunched the warm shelter.

Every evening, from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m., 2 to 3 workers took turns at the Halte to meet the primary needs (warm place to rest, meal, coffee, etc.) of an average of 25 people per night

The team of advisors is also present to offer active listening, respond to immediate intervention needs and guide users when possible.

A definite highlight was that thanks to James from Food Depot, we were able to provide quality, diverse and varied dishes to our users. In addition to the (about) 400 sandwiches per week that were provided by the volunteers of the Parish.

We have also introduced workshops and activities which have been well received and contributed greatly to the quality of services we were able to offer.



2022 objectives:

- Make this resource known so that it can benefit as many people as possible.
- Diversify and increase services, consolidate access to external resources for users).

Prevention CDN-NDG extends its gratitude to all the partners who make it possible to carry out social intervention projects.

Hip Hop You Don't Stop in 2021

The festival this year was a special edition, not just because this was its first comprehensive hybrid edition with content online and in person, but because it took place right at the start of new COVID-19 protocols. This proved challenging in many ways, especially in being able to provide opportunities for communing for as much of the neighborhood as possible. But as evidenced by the enthusiasm shown during livestreams and the buzz surrounding the outdoor events (which included concerts, dance battles, food tents and crafts), nothing was getting in the way of hip-hop culture providing for its people. And it don't stop!

Graffiti: The mandate of our mural art program is to do social mediation through art, to prevent crime while improving the urban landscapes, while preventing vandalism.

In May 2021, Prévention CDN-NDG was invited by Marcelle Partouche Gutierrez of Rap Battle for Social Justice to participate in a commemorative mural project for Nicolas Gibbs, a young black man killed by police in NDG. During the summer of 2021, Prévention CDN-NDG, in collaboration with Head and Hands and the Maison des Jeunes CDN, organized workshops using the Rap Battles model which combines a more traditional approach to workshops with a creative approach. Three workshops were organized on topics such as knowing your rights when arrested by the police and relational intelligence.

The mural, by Ottawa artist DriprSoul, is also the result of a consultative process that selected 6 of more than 50 recommendations presented to the city by a coalition of community groups to address systemic racism. in municipal institutions and at the municipal level in Montreal.

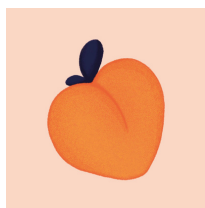

Prevention of sexual violence

Our Genders and Equality “Culture of Consent” project aims to prevent and oppose sexual harassment and encourage a culture of consent in high schools and communities in the areas of Côte-des-Neiges, Notre-Dame-de-Grâce, Outremont and Town of Mount Royal, by raising awareness among young people aged 12 to 17 in CDN-NDG about sexual victimization and the different forms of control (manipulation/ blackmail) in interpersonal relationships online and offline, and creating safe and emancipatory spaces for young people that promote positive identity building in order to reduce their vulnerability to sexual exploitation.

The objectives of the project are to:

- Create systemic changes in school policies and practices related to preventing, detecting and intervening in situations of sexual harassment.
- Extend these changes to the community, meaning to organizations and other institutions working with youth, in order to have a collective impact on this issue and contribute to advancing gender equality at an economic, social, and democratic level.
- Cultivate consent culture in targeted schools and neighbourhoods in order to prevent sexual harassment and violence.
- Foster and support the development of a sense of engagement in young people as relates to consent culture.

In 2021, the covid-19 pandemic continued to have a significant impact on the implementation of the project in the community and school sectors, but the development and creation of the toolkit were completed, and we look forward to embarking on the workshops in 2022.

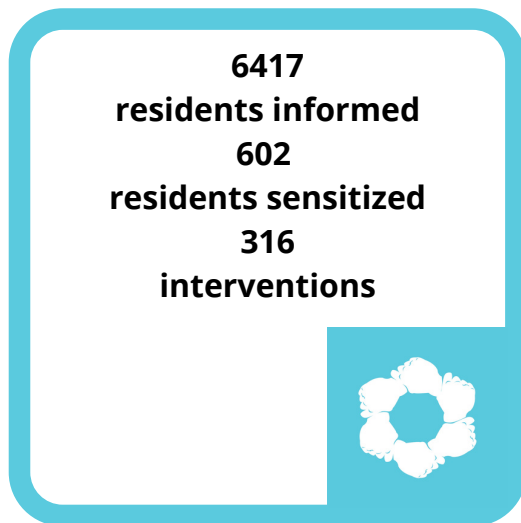

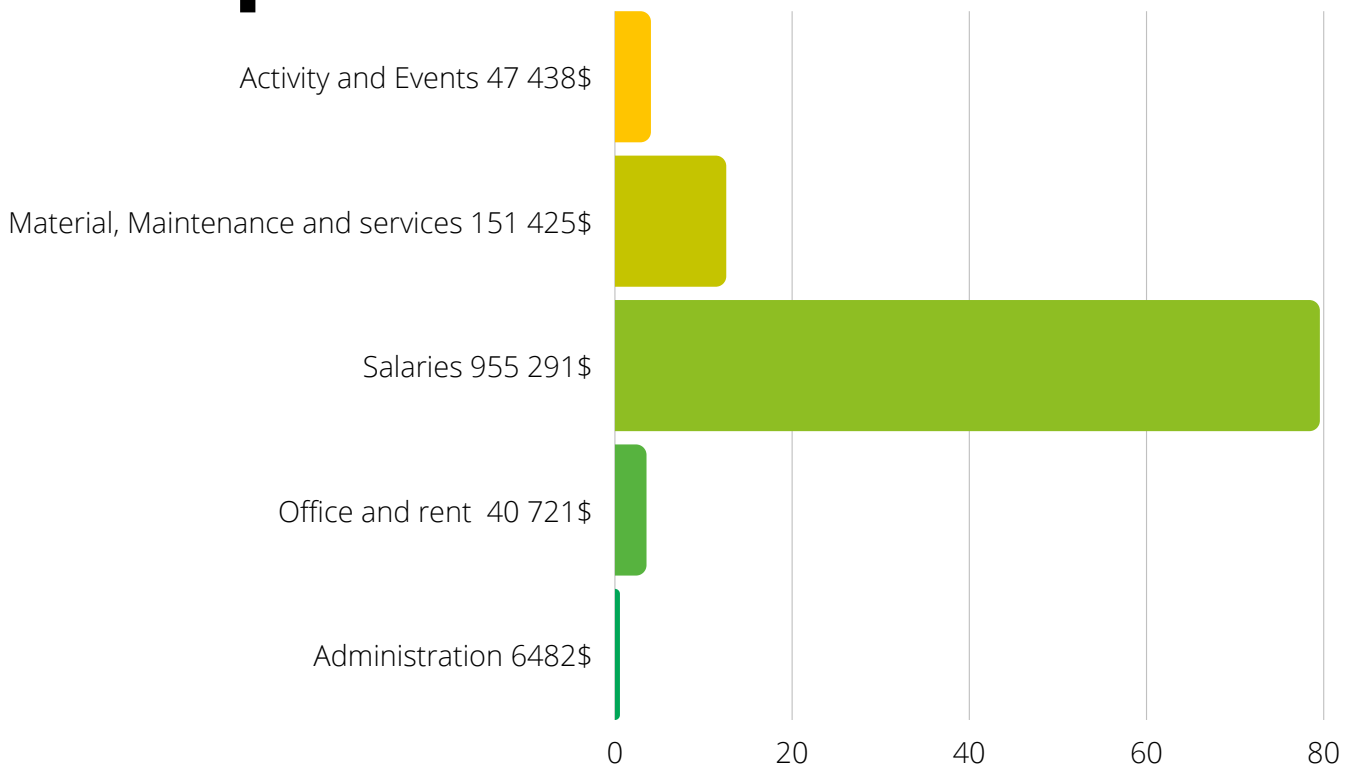

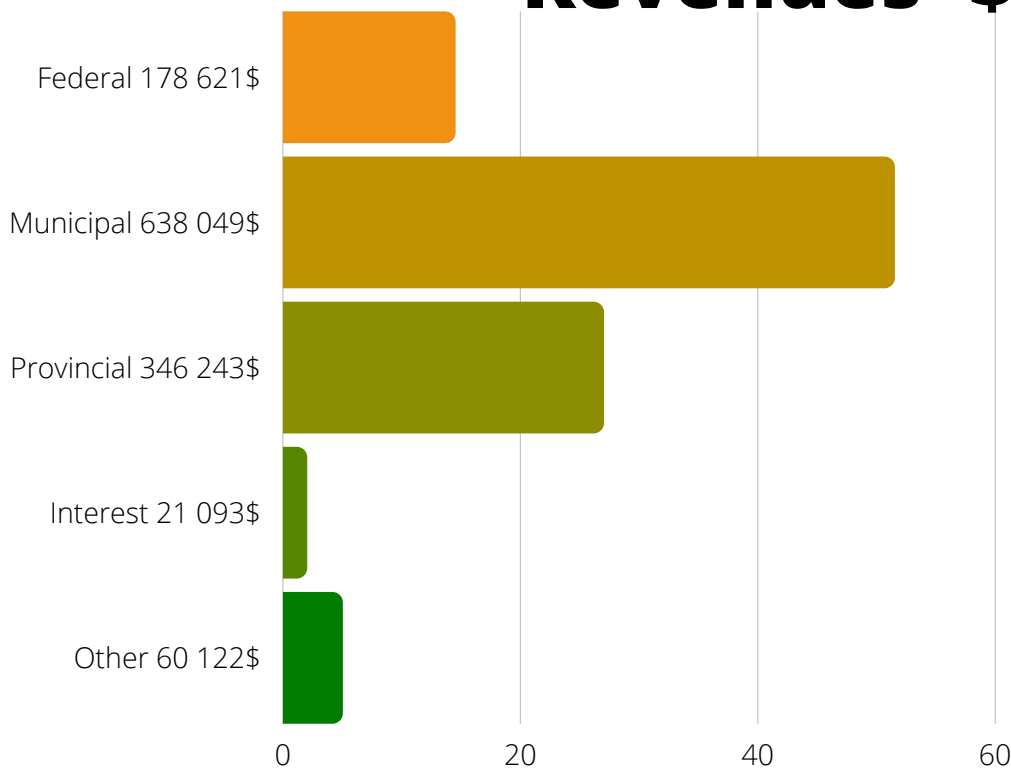
Program Impact In Numbers
